"The Importance of Right Motivation"

Romans 12:1-2 Sunday, January 7, 2024

Introduction: The right motivation is important in every area of life.

- 1. In the workplace, motivation is important.
- Some people are motivated by their paycheck. Work is just a job.
- Others are motivated by liking their job and doing their best.
 - 2. In school, motivation is important.
- Some students are motivated by grades.
- Some are motivated by teachers and coaches.
- Some are motivated by learning.
 - 3. In athletics, motivation is important.
- Some athletes are motivated by winning.
- Some are motivated by coaches.
- Some are motivated by ego.
- Some are motivated by their love for their sport.

Nowhere is motivation more important than in the Christian life. Sadly, many Christians have little if any motivation to live a godly life. Equally sad, there are many Christians with the wrong motivation to live a godly life. In Romans chapter 12, the apostle Paul gives the right motivation to live a godly life.

Text: Romans 12:1-2

- "beseech" (NKJ) = urge=Paul encouraged the believers in Rome not demanded.
- To reflect on the mercies of God.
 - 1. The right motivation to live a godly life is the mercies of God.
- The NLT says this in a more contemporary way.
- Remembering all that God has done for us is the right motivation to live a godly life.

Application: Think of some of the things that God has done for you.

- God made a way for you to spend eternity in heaven.
- God gave you the Holy Spirit to help you, comfort you, and be your counselor until you go to heaven.
- God paid your sin debt with the blood of Jesus (2 Cor. 5:21).
 - 2. When our motivation is right, we will have a desire to be a living sacrifice.
- To be a living sacrifice seems an oxymoron because sacrifices are usually dead.
- An oxymoron is a figure of speech that seems to contradict itself, but in context makes a point.

Illustration: Some examples: old news, organized chaos, awfully good, accurate estimate, etc.

- In the old covenant, God accepted the sacrifice of dead animals. Because Christ became the ultimate sacrifice, the Old Testament sacrifices are no longer of any effect (Hebrew 9:11-12). For Christians, the only acceptable sacrifice is to offer ourselves completely to God (be a living sacrifice).
- As a living sacrifice (offering ourselves completely to God)
 - 1. Our thinking will be different.
 - 2. Our value system will be different.
 - 3. Our daily walk with God will be <u>different</u> and <u>consistent.</u> How?
 - 1. Our daily time in God's Word will be routine and amazing.

A Personnel Word: Whatever your Bible reading plan is I encourage you to begin with Psalm 119:18.

The word translated "see" in Psalm 119:18 in the NKJ is translated and "behold" in the ESV is the Hebrew word "idou" which in our contemporary world would be translated "WOW."

Illustration: Perhaps you were given a Christmas gift and when you opened it you said "wow. A "wow" gift is better than a "what" gift.

Illustration: A few days after Christmas I was given a "wow" gift. (To hear the story, listen to the sermon on the church web page).

2. Our daily prayer times will be as frequent as breathing.

When we are a living sacrifice, our work for God will one day be our legacy. Let me ask you:

- What legacy will you leave your family?
- What legacy will you leave those who know you?
- What legacy will I leave our church?
- I hope Paul's words to the elders in Ephesus can be said of me: "Life is worth nothing unless I use it for doing the work assigned me by the Lord Jesus—the work of telling others the Good News about God's mighty kindness and love" (Acts 20:24, TLB).
- This is what a living sacrifice is!

Conclusion: You can't be a living sacrifice if you have never put your faith in Jesus Christ the ultimate sacrifice. How can you know?

- 1. Is your thinking different?
- 2. Is your value system different than the world's value system?
- 3. Is your daily time in God's word routine and amazing?
- 4. Do you have a desire to live for God?
